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Profile of the month

Jennifer A. H. Bell, Ph.D.

Dr. Jennifer A.H. Bell is a bioethicist and clinician investigator at the Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, University Health Network, Toronto, Canada. She is an Assistant Professor (status only) in the University of Toronto Department of Psychiatry and Dalla Lana School of Public Health, and Member of the Joint Centre for Bioethics. Jennifer received a bachelor's degree in philosophy specializing in bioethics from the University of Toronto, a master's degree in philosophy and biomedical ethics from McGill University, and a Ph.D. in interdisciplinary studies (bioethics and psychosocial oncology) from the University of British Columbia. She is an alumna of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research Psychosocial Oncology Research Training and Ethics of Health Research and Policy Training Programs.



Ethics, equity and cancer care

Approximately 1 in 4 Canadians will die from cancer. Innovative discovery, precision medicine, and breakthrough therapies are fast emerging as sources of hope for people with cancer. An additional end-of-life care option is legal access to medical assistance in dying (MAID). These revolutionary advances in cancer care also pose significant ethical issues for professionals, patients and support persons, such as equitable access, safeguarding the vulnerable from known and potential harms, especially those facing limited treatment options, as well as the emergence of new ethical dilemmas that often accompany complex medical innovation. Given the increased prevalence of patients living with advanced cancer, there is an urgent need to develop, and rigorously evaluate, decisional support interventions and policies that address these pressing ethical issues in a rapidly evolving healthcare landscape.

As Research Director of the JustCan Ethics Lab, my program of research utilizes empirical and normative bioethics, critical and feminist methodologies, and qualitative and mixed-methods to address these and other urgent ethical issues at the frontier of cancer care within the specific

themes of novel therapeutics, clinical trials, and MAID. As a bioethicist I am actively involved in cancer ethics and policy development at the local and national level. I am a member of the Canadian Partnership Against Cancer Health Economics Advisory Committee, whose mandate includes enhancing equity in the cancer control system. I am also an ethics expert on the CADTH pan-Canadian Oncology Drug Review (pCODR) Expert Review Committee (pERC), which assesses clinical evidence and cost-effectiveness of cancer drugs to make recommendations to guide provincial and territorial drug funding decisions. At the hospital level I provide bioethics consultation and education for clinical cases involving MAID requests, and the ethical issues associated with equitable patient access to experimental and emerging cancer therapies.

My research program is supported by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, Canadian Cancer Society Research Institute, Colorectal Cancer Canada, University of Toronto, and the Global Institute of Psychosocial, Palliative and End-of-Life Care.

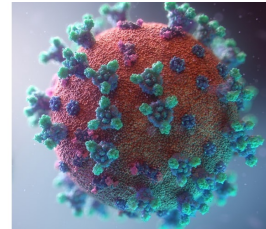

Equity, diversity and inclusion (EDI) symposium and health ethics seminar

This year this EDI symposium will take the form of a longitudinal series of events. In collaboration with the John Dossetor Health Ethics Centre and the Office of EDI FoMD lunchtime talks on racism and anti-racism are, and will be, continuously scheduled. The inaugural event for Fall 2020 takes place on October 8th, with a presentation by Kim TallBear on Indigenous People and Systemic Racism. Scientific research, technology, and related policy is usually structured by colonial worldviews. This is because such worldviews structure our entire society, and no one is exempt from that. This talk defines "indigenization," "reconciliation," and "decolonization" - the differences in meaning and where they overlap. The talk also discusses efforts to transform scientific research, technology development, and training in order to increase the benefit of science and technology for Indigenous peoples and other marginalized people.
